Greetings Mustang!

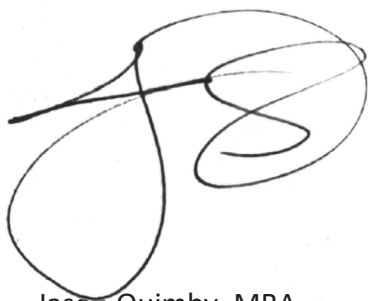

The VP works to ensure that the university, division, and department missions are valued and met.

Director of Housing and Residence Life

The Director of Housing and Residence Life develops policy and procedure aimed at promoting an environment of living and learning. This includes but is not limited to development of programming and safety enforcement based on student driven needs and institution requirements.

Hall Director

The Hall Director is the students' direct line of communication within the residence halls. They are the liaison to leadership and focus programming geared towards the students in their residence hall.

Resident Assistants

The Resident Assistants (RAs) are student leaders employed by the Department of Housing and Residence Life to serve as the primary resource for on campus residents. An RA is assigned to every residential hall. The primary duties of an RA are to build a community within each residence hall, ensure the safety of students, and manage individual halls.



Residency Requirements

On-campus housing provides endless perks and advantages throughout each semester, providing a well-rounded student experience. Living on campus provides easy access to WNMU community programming, such as events and activities hosted by Student Life, on-campus concerts and access to Light Hall Theater for weekly movies.

WNMU Housing and Residential Life requires students to reside on campus if the following apply to them:

- Student is under the age of 21**
- Student has less than 30 credits**
- Student lives outside of the 4-county area**

There is multiple housing option at WNMU. We hope you find one that fits you!

WNMU Housing does not currently provide Family, Staff, or Faculty Housing. All housing on campus is considered traditional student housing.

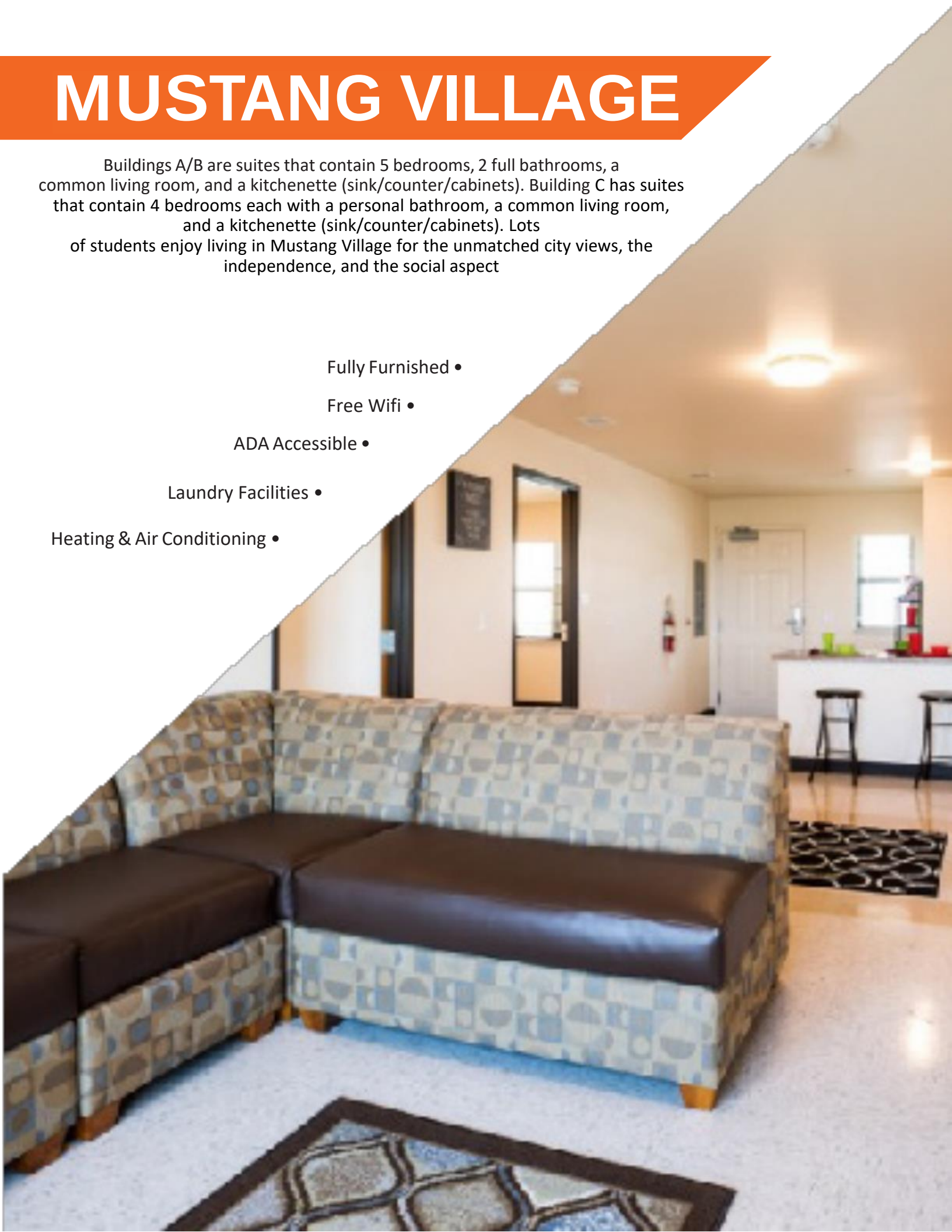

Safety & Security

Campus Police

The WNMU Campus Police force is fully-equipped and certified law enforcement agency headquartered on campus. In addition to traditional law enforcement activities, the men and women of this department provide auxiliary services to WNMU students, including car jumpstarts and escorts with necessary.

Call Boxes

There are call boxes placed throughout the residential areas for students to use. These boxes call straight to Campus Police. Any student in need of immediate assistance in the case of an emergency is allowed to use the call box.

Mustang Alerts

Students receive emergency alerts that will go to their phone. Standard rates apply.

On Call

Because the residence halls are open 24 hours, there are a number of on-call numbers for students to reach professional staff should they need assistance after business hours.

Holiday Breaks

Housing and Residence Life allows students to remain in their residence halls over breaks/when campus is closed this excludes summer term unless enrolled. Centennial Hall is the only hall open during the summer.

Fire Safety

There are routine fire drills throughout the semester to ensure students are made aware of emergency procedures. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors or sprinkler system and fire extinguishers.

Services

Cable/Internet

All individual rooms and suites are equipped with cable and Ethernet outlets. The campus Wi-Fi also is available in the residence halls at no charge to students.

Laundry

Each residence hall has a laundry room that includes both washers and dryers. Students have 24-hour access to these facilities.

Mail Boxes

The mail room on campus provides a postal box to residential students at no charge. Students are assigned a key to their box and can check their box any time of the week during business hours. Students who reside in Muir Heights can open a PO box at the local Post Office at no charge.

Maintenance Request

The WNMU Maintenance team is on call 24/7 should something in the residence halls need immediate attention. Maintenance request can be submitted through an RA, HD, or other Housing and Residence Life staff.

Move In/Move Out

The Housing and Residence Life staff will always assist a student with the check-in and check-out process. A student should always contact their RA for assistance with these processes to ensure the proper steps are being taken in order to avoid additional charges.

Hidalgo Medical Services (HMS)

HMS provides medical, dental, and mental health services to students living on-campus. These services are free of charge with the presentation of a university ID card.

Pest Control

The university provides a monthly room spray to avoid bugs/pest.

Vending

There are multiple vending machines located around the residence halls that allow students to purchase drinks and snacks.

Accessibility Services

All of our residential halls have ADA options that are available year round. Students can work with Housing and Disability Services to accommodate needs.

Student Code of Conduct

WNMU takes conduct very seriously. We expect our students present themselves as young, mature adults who are here to take their lives to the next level. There are policies in place so the university can ensure students safety, success, and achievements.

Alcohol

WNMU is not a dry campus within the residence halls. However, careful guidance is given to those who are of age and reside in the institution. The university abides by all state and federal regulations regarding alcohol and does not promote nor permit those who are under the legal limit (21 years of age) to consume alcohol in the residence halls. In addition, those who are of age to legally consume alcohol are not permitted to consume in front of those who are underage. WNMU reserves the right to revoke any alcohol privileges within the residence halls if a violation is discovered.

Drugs

WNMU does not permit drugs of any kind on campus. While the use of marijuana is legal in the State of New Mexico for those above the age of 21, possession and or smoking is not allowed within the residence halls or on campus for any reason.

Smoking

Smoking is not permitted within the residence halls. This includes vape pens, e-cigs, hookahs, etc. Should you wish to smoke tobacco cigarettes, there are designated areas around campus for this. If at the residence halls, you must be 25 feet away from any building to smoke a cigarette.

Appliances

Students are not permitted to have cooking appliances, unprotected extension cords or outlet extenders, etc. within the residence halls as these items are a potential fire hazard. Should unauthorized appliances (excluding microwaves, toasters, blenders, 2QT crock pots and coffee pots, waffle irons) be found, they will be confiscated, and the student will receive an incident report and be sent through the judicial process. A good rule to follow, if the item has a timer and no open element it will be authorized.

Candles/Incense

With these items being a fire hazard, they are not allowed in the Mustang Village and Centennial Hall. If they are found, they will be confiscated, and the student will receive an incident report and be sent through the judicial process.

Use of Sage, Sweetgrass, and Cedar in Residence Halls

In support of the spiritual lives of American Indian/Alaska natives, WNMU Housing Policies allow the spiritual use of sage, sweetgrass, and cedar smoke, when its use is for the purpose of purification and prayer; is consistent with time-honored cultural, traditional, and spiritual observances; and complies with the protocols outlined in this document.

Protocol:

Use in a private room: discuss the use of these items with your Residence Hall Director or the Director of Housing and Residence Life. This person is trained to understand the importance of your request and the value of respect, diversity, and confidentiality. Among the questions the staff will ask is the frequency with which you expect to use these plants for ceremonial/purification purposes. In addition, you may be asked to provide documentation of your respective group you belong to.

Quiet Hours

The residences halls have students, visitors, and staff residing year-round. Out of respect, WNMU enforces quiet hours between 10:00PM and 10:00AM Sunday thru Saturday.

Trash

The residence halls are provided with large dumpsters for the student's convenience. Should trash be found outside of a student's room, it may result in a fine and going through the judicial process.

If an RA notices excessive trash inside of a residential suite, they will provide the residents with a 24 hour trash removal notice. Should the residents fail to comply, they will be sent through the judicial process.

Animals/Pets

WNMU permits Service Animals and Emotional Support Animals. They must be registered through accessibility services. If an animal is found in the residence halls without proper documentation, the animal will be removed by local animal services.

Termination/Eviction for Cause

As a condition of residence in university housing, students are required to comply with all residence hall regulations, university policies, the Student Code of Conduct, and applicable federal, state, and local laws. The University may terminate a housing contract and require a student to vacate university housing for cause, including but not limited to serious or repeated violations of housing policies, conduct that endangers the health, safety, or welfare of any person, damage to university property, unlawful activity, disruption of the residential community, or failure to comply with directives issued by authorized university officials.

Except in circumstances requiring immediate action to protect persons, property, or the orderly operation of the University, students will be provided notice of the alleged violation and an opportunity to respond through the applicable university conduct or housing process. Emergency/Temporary removals may be imposed when the University determines that a student's continued presence in university housing presents a significant risk to health, safety, property, or the educational environment. Students whose housing contracts are terminated must vacate university housing within the time-frame specified by the University and in accordance with applicable institutional procedures and state law.

Administrative Procedures

Abandoned Property

Belongings or personal items left behind by a student will be considered abandoned property. All items remaining in the student's unit after check-out will be discarded. The Office of Housing and Residence Life is not responsible for belongings or personal items left behind by a student.

Room Change Requests

WNMU Housing and Residence Life give students the choice to select their own rooming assignments that will be approved by housing staff. If a student wishes to change rooms, they will have the first two weeks of the semester to submit a Room Change Request that will be reviewed and processed in the order received.

Roommate Agreements

To avoid conflicts amongst roommates, resident assistants will have all residential suites complete roommate agreements at the start of each semester. If a resident has a problem, they should bring it to the attention of their RA. In situations where the resident feels uncomfortable addressing their RA, they may bring their concern directly to their Hall Director. Housing Staff will see these concerns are addressed in a prompt and fair manner.

Lockouts

If a resident is locked out of their room/suite, the resident should contact their RA for assistance or RA on-call. The RA's on-call phone number can be found on the sticker on the back of all suite doors. Residents receive one lock-out at no charge and an assessment of \$15 for every additional lockout after that will be added to the student's Housing account. After the 5th lockout the student will be assessed a \$30 charge.

Lost Keys

Lost keys should be reported to the RA immediately after noticing it being lost. Residents will be charged the full amount of materials and labor for a lock change. Once a lock change has been completed, the charge cannot be reversed.

Lost or Stolen Items

WNMU Housing and Residence Life is not responsible for lost or stolen items from your room or parking lot. Each student is given a personal ID card that has swipe access into only their suite and a hard key for their individual bedroom. It is the responsibility of all residents to keep their doors locked and personal items secured. If a resident's personal items are lost or stolen, the resident should notify their RA and Campus Police immediately to file a report. Campus Police will keep the residents informed of the status.

Room Entry

On occasion, the University housing staff will exercise their contractual right to enter a room or suite. A Housing and Residence Life staff (RA included) may enter under the following conditions:

- Scheduled safety checks
- Wellness check
- To provide maintenance
- If there is reason to believe there is a violation of a university policy or regulation
- If an emergency exists or is believed to exist

Housing staff entering a room must always knock and announce themselves before entering. Once that has been done, they have the ability to enter a room and complete their duties.

Room Searches

Office of Housing and Residence Life staff are permitted to search a student's suite/room under the following conditions:

- A clear indication that the established conduct, standard health, or safety regulations are being violated.
- Emergency situation exists that requires the search of a room for a particular item or person.
- There is evidence of the use, possession, or sale of illegal drugs. In this instance, a room/suite will be searched if one or more of the following conditions exists:
 - o A staff member observes the contraband or smells the odor of what they believe is a drug.
 - o A report is filed by an individual believed to be a reliable source.

During the search process, failure to comply with any reasonable requests by a university official may result in further conduct action. Reasonable requests shall include emptying pockets, clothing, purses, etc.

WNMU reserves the right to search any building on campus, including campus housing units. Based on the results of the search there may sanctions levied upon the resident which may include termination from being a resident.

All entries and searches by non-university staff will be coordinated with Campus Police.

The Director of Housing and Residence Life or designee will accompany such outside personnel as an observer.



Emergency Procedures

Emergency Contacts

In the event of an emergency, call 911. To contact Campus Police, call 575-538-6231 (during business hours). After hours and weekends, call 575-388-8844.

- Should you have to make an emergency call, give a clear description of the problem, your location, and your name.
- Immediately following this call, contact your RA or the RA on call.

Bomb Threat

If a bomb threat is received, the resident should:

- Note the exact time of the call.
- Write down as accurately as possible all statements made by caller.
- Listen to the voice to determine caller's sex, age, accent, and any other distinguishing features.
- Listen for background noises.
- Note alleged location of the device.
- Immediately notify local authorities (911) and RA/Housing Staff.

In the event of a bomb threat requiring evacuation of a building, residents will be alerted by law enforcement, emergency management personnel, and/or Office of Housing and Residence Life.

A bomb threat, even one made as a prank, is a violation of federal, state, and local laws.

Emergency Evacuations and Drills

In the event of an actual emergency (fire, tornado, etc.) or a periodic drill, students must follow all directions given by staff members. It is of the utmost importance that anyone in a room/suite responds promptly in an emergency situation for the safety of that individual and for safety of all. This same compliance is expected of guests. Failure to comply during drills or emergencies may result in disciplinary action.

Fire Evacuation Procedures

All residents are required to follow university fire and safety regulations.

- Periodic fire drills may be required to ensure that residents know what to do in the event of a fire.
- All residents and guests are required to evacuate a building when the alarm is sounded.
- In the event the alarm sounds:
 - o All occupants are required to leave the building at once.
 - o If you are away from your building when alarm sounds, do not return.
 - o Campus Police or Fire Marshal will give directive when building is safe to enter again.

Power Outage

In the event of a power outage, students should remain calm and contact housing staff. In the event of a prolonged power outage, staff will coordinate additional accommodations as necessary.

Weather Conditions

During severe weather watches and warnings, residents should be prepared to take proper precautions. Windows should be shut, and battery-operated lights should be kept closed. Residents should be prepared to evacuate to designated safe areas should that directive be given by housing staff.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

What should I bring to my residence hall?

Twin size XL bedding, microwave, refrigerator, coffee maker, shower curtain, toilet paper, cleaning materials, broom, mop, television, groceries.

What can I not have in the residence hall?

Candles, incense, cooking appliances, pets, curtains, lava lamps, and unprotected extension cords.

What meal plan options do I have?

19 meals per week w/ \$175 flex: \$2795.57

175 Block per semester with \$225 flex: \$2535.79

150 Block per semester with \$250 flex: \$2334.93

There are also commuter plans for those who live off campus or reside in Muir Heights.

Can I get out of my housing contract at any point in the semester?

No, the Housing contract is a 9-month legally binding document. Once a student signs the contract, they are committed to the lease for two semesters. There are strict circumstances that allow a student to break the lease. Those are determined by the Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management.

Addendum 1

Rights Following Termination/Eviction of Housing

- 1) You have the right to due process through the student code of conduct hearing.
- 2) If you are found at fault through a committee of your peers you will be evicted from WNMU Housing for the period of one year from the date you vacated.
- 3) You have the right to appeal your eviction through the Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management within 5 working days after you are found at fault.
- 4) If you are found not at fault, your administrative eviction will be lifted and you will be allowed to move back into campus housing.

Appeals Process

Purpose

This appeal process provides students with a fair and structured method to request reconsideration of a decision resulting in removal from university housing.

1. Eligibility to Appeal

Students who have received a formal notice of removal from university housing may submit an appeal if they meet at least one of the following criteria:

- New information has become available that was not considered during the original decision.
- There is evidence of procedural error that may have affected the outcome.
- The sanction is believed to be disproportionate to the violation.

2. Timeline for Submission

- Appeals must be submitted within 5 working days after being found at fault through a committee of your peers after the student conduct process.
- If an emergency occurs prior to, or on the date of the deadline during business hours, please reach out to the Vice President of Student Affairs.

3. Required Appeal Materials

Students must submit a complete appeal packet including:

- A written appeal letter (see Section 4 for format)
- Any supporting documentation (e.g., medical records, statements, evidence)
- Copy of the original housing removal notice
- Incomplete submissions may delay or invalidate the appeal.

4. Appeal Letter Guidelines

The appeal letter should include:

- Student's full name and Woo number
- Current contact information
- Clear statement of the reason for appeal
- Detailed explanation addressing one or more eligibility criteria
- Supporting facts and relevant documentation references
- Desired outcome (e.g., reinstatement, probationary housing status)

5. Submission Process

Appeals may be submitted through one of the following methods:

- Official Student Email to the Office of Housing and Residence Life or the Vice President of Student Affairs
- In-person submission to the Housing Office or through the Vice President of Student Affairs
- All submissions must be time-stamped within the deadline.

6. Review Process

- Appeals are reviewed by the Vice President of Student Affairs or a designated person.
- The Vice President will evaluate all submitted materials and may request additional information or a meeting with the student.
- Decisions are typically rendered within 10 working days after submission.

7. Possible Outcomes

The appeal decision may result in:

- Approval: Removal decision overturned; student reinstated into housing
- Conditional Approval: Student allowed to return under specific conditions (e.g., probation, behavioral contract)
- Denial: Original housing removal decision upheld

8. Final Decision

All appeal decisions are considered final. There is no further internal appeal beyond this process.

9. Interim Housing Status

Unless otherwise specified, students removed from housing must vacate their residence according to the original notice timeline. Filing an appeal does not automatically delay removal.

Emergency/Temporary Housing

In cases of emergency WNMU housing provides temporary housing for students not to exceed two weeks in time. This is typically provided for students off campus and it is meant for people typically do not live on campus. However, exceptions can be made by the Director of Housing and Residence Life.
